APPENDIX A

The women listed in Appendix A are those identified as members of two or more of the philanthropic organisations discussed in this thesis, that is, members of the philanthropic network. In addition, a number of nuns and women to whom specific reference has been made in the text have been included. Excluded are women who are listed in a biographical table in this thesis or otherwise discussed and for whom no additional, significant or relevant data has been found. The sources establishing their membership of each organisation are given in the relevant chapter and not duplicated here.

The aim of providing this Appendix is twofold. Primarily, it is hoped to provide an additional perspective to women's Each entry has the potential of being expanded philanthropy. as has been done in Chapter 6, which examined in detail the philanthropy of Helen Fell. Secondly, the Appendix preserves biographical material that is otherwise uncollated. Such material on prominent men is reasonably accessible, especially given the number of biographical registers for parliamentarians. Information about prominent women, even given the increasing correction of male bias in the A.D.B., is much more difficult to lo-It is hoped that the biographical information provided here will be of use to future researchers seeking to extend the themes of this thesis. Constraints of space have, however, limited the number and length of entries.

Two obvious sources of information for this Appendix have been little used. Cobb's biographical Appendix was compiled without the assistance of many of the sources available to this author, particularly the invaluable A.D.B. Consequently, her information proved to be frequently inaccurate and so was not used. Another potential source of information was the archives of the Society of Australian Genealogists. This was little used as the Society's procedures proved prohibitively time-consuming. The library is open four days a week

for five hours a day. Material ordered from the archives is strictly limited to four items a time (including different volumes or parts of the same collection of material), ordered on the hour (that is, a limit of four times daily). This is apparently satisfactory for amateur historians researching their own family for whom the Society primarily caters. For research to extend the information given in this appendix, however, the procedure severely limited utilisation of the vast amount of biographical information the Society has collected.

In a number of instances, the sources for an entry provide conflicting information. In these cases, I have chosen the most authoritative. Discrepancies in the sources are particularly frequent as to the number of children, due largely to the practice of ignoring those who died in infancy. It should be remembered that the existence of such additional children is far from irrelevant when examining the lives of their parents and particularly, mothers.
